# St Margaret's Celebrations and AGM 2022

I think we'll all agree it was great to be back in the Castle to celebrate St Margaret's day and hold our AGM, and what a joyous occasion it turned out be. There was a wonderful turn-out from so many of our members, as we were honoured to welcome our Patron HRH the Princess Royal.

As always, our day started with a service of celebration from our President, Rev Neil Gardener, in St-Margaret's Chapel, followed by our AGM and lunch. For those of you who could not attend, the link to the service is still available within the members section of our website. We were delighted to be joined by two of the Guild's Honorary Vice Presidents, and representatives of the Moderator of the Church of Scotland, the President of the Bishops' Conference and the Primus of the Episcopal Church in Scotland, as well as guests from Edinburgh Castle, Historic Environment Scotland and Scotland's Churches' Trust. Two students with connections to the Hungarian Exchange programme run by Queen Margaret University were also able to be with us, along with the Consul General for Hungary, Dr Lazlo Kalman and the Lord Lieutenant of Edinburgh, Robert Aldridge.

Six new members were welcomed into The Guild last year, with three members (Margaret Allan, Margaret Grievell and Lucy Margaret Nicholson) being received by HRH. We were delighted to have Maggie Anderson join the Executive Committee. Hazel Dunn was re-elected as Convenor. There was a presentation to thank Margaret Ann Crawford as she retires after six years as our Treasurer. Our Convenor Hazel Dunn presented HRH with a pair of SMCG daisy and pearl earrings (she already has our brooch, which she wore on the day) to thank her for her twenty years' service as our Patron. As promised the Princess wore her earrings to her next engagement, at Dunfermline Abbey for the signing of the St Margaret's Declaration of Friendship.

As the AGM was drawn to a close HRH spoke about the good a group like ours can do and encouraged us not to forget that it only takes one person to create goodness and change within themselves and for others. It was a very poignant end to a very special day and in essence reminding us of all the good one woman did in her time: St Margaret Queen of Scotland.
























# THE 950<sup>th</sup> ANNIVERSARY OF DUNFERMLINE ABBEY

On the Feast Day of Saint Margaret of Scotland, Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> November 2022, a Service of Worship was held in Dunfermline Abbey Church to celebrate the 950<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the founding of a priory on the site by Queen Margaret.

The occasion was also significant in that St Margaret Declaration of Friendship between the Roman Catholic Church of Scotland and the Church of Scotland being signed.

Attending the Service were Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal, The Most Revd Leo Cushley, Archbishop and Metropolitan of St Andrews and Edinburgh plus leaders and clergy from all denominations of the Christian Church

Perfection, Light, Life and Love were highlighted by pupils of Dunfermline High School as the 4 miracles pertaining to St. Margaret.



A new anthem, written for the occasion by Lisa McMaster entitled 'Thou Lord and God of Power' was sung by the Dunfermline Abbey Choristers who were joined by members of Kilgraston School Chamber Choir which was a grand, beautiful, slightly haunting piece of music very suitable for the occasion.

In his sermon, Archbishop Cushley said that Margaret was very real to us, not an aura of a Celtic myth, even at this distance in time. We can honour her goodness, strength of character, patience, mercy, determination, sense of justice and her holiness. We can learn from her to pledge ourselves to work as she did for the peace and properity of our land. He delivered a very meaningful sermon on Christian unity which befitted the occasion.

Following the signing of the Declaration, Princess Anne spoke in a relaxed, occasionally humorous, way about St Margaret's message of unity and friendship and that she was honoured to be present for the signing of the Declaration of Friendship. She promised the assembled congregation that it had been signed as she had witnessed it! She referred to her presence that morning at the St Margaret Chapel Guild service in the Castle chapel. She emphasised the royal service given by Margaret to the community which should be maintained by the church and her commitment to education.

It was altogether a very historic, enjoyable and memorable Service, which I felt privileged, as a lifelong member of the Abbey, to attend, and also to act as the official representative of the St Margaret Guild. I did miss not being able to attend the Guild service, lunch and meeting, but I could not be at both occasions unless the Princess Royal had given me a lift over to Dunfermline!

#### A Day in the Life of....

Every day in Edinburgh Castle for its Governor is as different as the weather. The role is now done by me, as a Major General in the Army Reserve, which means that I fulfil my military duties in tandem with the commitments of my civilian career.

In my case, I fit the duties as Governor of Edinburgh Castle into a portfolio career as a broadcaster (for Sky News and ABC News in America); as an historical advisor for film and TV drama (currently shaping a new ITV series); a documentary maker and author. The thread that runs through all this work is a deep interest in what shapes a nation, its history and the meanings behind its traditions and protocol. As a result of this, I feel there is a strong synergy between my non-military work and the privilege of being Governor and, therefore, the guardian of such a treasure in Scotland's story.

The year has four immovable events that the Governor is expected to support. These are The King's Royal Week in Holyrood House, in the summer; the Lord High Commissioner of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland's term of office, in May; the Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo, in August, and November's Acts of Remembrance.

The Governor's role in the first two, stems from a time when the Castle provided security to the monarch and his representatives, when in Edinburgh. The Tattoo is just over 70 years old. Remembrance events emerged from

the 1918 Armistice and is poignantly part of the Castle's fabric in the Scottish National War Memorial, of which the Governor is a Trustee, and in which are commemorated four of the Scots Guardsmen I went to war with in 1982 but did not bring home.

In addition, the Governor represents The King in his principal Scottish fortress; supports the Army in Scotland and embodies the tradition of Scotland's Armed Forces, past, present and future, in Edinburgh Castle, which is the 'foundation stone of the Scottish martial tradition'.

Each year there are also a calendar of Gun Salutes, which are ordered by The King, to mark days like His Majesty's birthday (actual and official), accession and coronation (which will be fired first this year). All of this requires planning. Much of this is done by the Army Staff and I am supported by my Aide de Camp and Linda Lyness, my Personal Assistant, who has served thirteen governors in this role!

From my office in the Castle, looking across the Pentlands, or from a quiet corner of the set of Downton Abbey, via Zoom, I keep across the planning for events and my relationship with Edinburgh generally.

Ultimately, I serve to meet all official visitors, like Nancy Pelosi, then Speaker of the United States House of Representatives. But I also thrive among the tourists that are the life blood of the fortress. I feel a strong bond with the Historic Environment Scotland staff and I love seeing the Guild of St Margaret's, in any of their visits.

But perhaps the most memorable day so far was last June, when I had the privilege of surrendering the Key of Edinburgh Castle to Queen Elizabeth II. I had presented it privately to Her Majesty the year before, when she dined with us in the Governor's Quarter but the Act of Loyalty at Holyrood House, where the key had been presented to George IV two hundred years before, in 1822, was a profound privilege. She gave it back!

It was her last public duty with the Armed Forces. I shall stand ready to surrender the key to The King and fulfil any duties I am called to do, until I demit this huge privilege in September 2024. I know my successor will love the role and working with the Guild as much as I have.



Invitations are to be sent to Knights of St Columba, Knights of Malta and Provost of Fife to attend on the day. All up-to-date information will be posted under events on our members website page.

### **Scottish Tapestry**


Earlier this month I made a visit to Galashiels to see (again) the Scottish Tapestry. If you haven't seen it, I encourage you to go. The Borders train stops at Galashiels, and it is a short walk from there to the lovely new accessible building which has become home to the tapestry.

The Great Tapestry of Scotland, celebrates Scottish achievement and history. It depicts the history of Scotland through the skilful, colourful, and textural stitching by over 1,000 men women and children from Shetland to the Borders of Scotland, using 300 miles of wool.

Even if you are not a 'stitcher' one cannot help but admire the skills used to portray the 160 panels depicting the history of Scotland. There are several references to Queen Margaret, and indeed she has a panel all to herself, beautifully stitched by the St Margaret Stitchers, entitled St Margaret at Dunfermline 1080.

Alongside each panel there is a brief history depicted in the panel, and credit to those who stitched it.
