Edinburgh 900 Celebrations and St Margaret's Day

In addition to commissioning the building of the Chapel at the Castle to honour his mother, another legacy of King David I was that he granted Royal burgh status to Edinburgh 900 years ago. While the exact date for the latter is not known, Edinburgh Council have arranged a programme of activities to mark the event. These will run from 2024 to 2025.

A reception was held at the City Chambers in May to launch the celebrations. The Guild was invited to attend the event and their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh were the guests of honour. Organisations and businesses representing diverse aspects of Edinburgh were present, including the military, faith groups, voluntary organisations and schools. I represented the Guild, and also present was a delegate from the National Guild of St Margaret of Scotland. This genealogy group, who are based in America, are long-standing members of the Guild and it was good to meet one of their number in person, David Medeiros.

The committee discussed how we could participate more in the city-wide commemorations and made the decision that this year we will open our St Margaret's Day service to members of the public. This would not be practical at the Chapel, so we intend to host the event at our 'second home', the Canongate Kirk. This will enable us to invite representatives from schools, churches and other organisations that are not members of the Guild, as well as local people who would not be eligible to join the Guild on account of not having Margaret in their name. Due to the change of venue for the service, the AGM will also be held at the Canongate this year, and there will be no lunch. Further details of the day will be circulated with the AGM notice in October and on the Guild website www.stmargaretschapel.com

Exploring new ways to donate

Since booklets were removed from the Chapel last year, we have seen a noticeable drop-off in cash donations. While we were aware there were many people taking booklets without donating, it has still resulted in a drop. The committee has therefore been exploring ways to change how people donate.

On visiting the Castle it is clear that many visitors are from abroad and that they also spend very little time in the Chapel, so we have been looking at installing a contactless payment terminal to offer an eye-catching representation of our organisation and to make donation swift and straightforward. To understand better how this could work for the Guild, Hazel Dunn and Angela Casey met with the team at the War Memorial to learn how contactless payment is working for them.

Hazel and Angela are now looking into costings to run a trial for six months with a provider who will supply a tap and pay machine. This machine would include a cash donation box as well as the opportunity for anyone to donate. This will allow us to use up the remaining booklets and also inspire would-be donators to support our work.

We are also exploring a leaflet or a downloadable information page via a QR code – offering something in return for the donation and hopefully forging future relationships with interested people. We hope to have the terminal installed later this year when we can monitor its success and allow us to make a decision for the future.

Sistema Scotland Event featuring Big Noise Wester Hailes and RSNO

This was a truly heartwarming event which I had the privilege to attend.

Sistema Scotland is a Scottish Charity that started and supports the Big Noise programme. In 2008 the programme commenced with 35 young schoolchildren; they currently support over 3,500 young people across Scotland. The charity works in underprivileged areas throughout Scotland to help children through music "to improve their concentration and language skills, enhance problem solving and decision making, increase their self-esteem and develop strong friendships and support networks".

The event was held at The Usher Hall. At the start of the evening, we had the opportunity to meet the parents and carers of some of the children who were performing. They talked about the positive influence the Big Noise had on the children, giving them a focus so that as their skills progressed, so did their confidence and self-esteem. The children thoroughly enjoyed travelling to the various events they attended throughout Scotland and best of all - they were having fun.

The performance began with Big Noise Wester Hailes and the Royal Scottish National Orchestra. Each child sat with their assigned member of the orchestra, one playing guitar and the others all playing brass instruments. They were outstanding with no sign of nerves but sheer concentration on each of their little faces. We could see that they were completely comfortable on stage as the RSNO had taken the time to work closely with each of them prior to the evening.

The audience were captivated by these very young performers from primary 3 to 6 who were beaming from ear to ear when, as you would imagine, they received a standing ovation.

The performance by Big Noise Wester Hailes was a delight to witness and then the RSNO performed *La Mer* -- what an evening!

It was clear to see the great work that Sistema Scotland and Big Noise Wester Hailes are doing for communities in Scotland.

Queen Margaret University Costume Showcase 2024

It was a pleasure to attend this year's show at the Traverse Theatre, Edinburgh. The costumes were outstanding as were the students who performed on the evening. What a fun, creative and professional show they put on and it was encouraging to see such an abundance of talent on our doorstep.

St Margaret in Lourdes

This statue of St Margaret, cast in bronze by Arthur Guéniot (1866-1951) in 1929/30, was commissioned by the Scottish National Pilgrimage Committee to Lourdes in south-west France. It is the only statue of a national patron to have been permitted in the Domaine of Lourdes.

The statue stands on the left bank of the River Gave, a short distance from the grotto where many believe the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared 18 times to a 14-year-old peasant girl, Bernadette Soubirous, in 1858.

While Lourdes is known as a pilgrimage destination recognised by the Catholic Church, visitors from all faiths and none from all over the world travel to this place of peace and prayer every year. Scots, in particular, seek out this statue of St Margaret to remember her kind and generous life, as a woman of faith, like Mary the mother of Jesus.


Introducing Our New Daisy Pendant

We were sorry to learn, belatedly, of the death in September 2023 of Hannah Frew Paterson MBE, an artist well known for her exquisite and original church embroidery.


In 1992 the Guild commissioned Hannah to create an altar cloth for the Chapel as part of its refurbishment prior to the 1993 celebrations marking nine hundred years since the death of Queen Margaret of Scotland. The beautiful altar cloth which she stitched for us was dedicated on St Margaret's Day in 1993 in the presence of our late Patron, HRH Princess Margaret.

By this time Hannah had become very interested in the work of the Guild. We had come to regard her as one of us and she was invited to the AGM for the next few years. In 1998 she was appointed an Honorary Vice President and the following year she was elected a Trustee. She retired in 2012.
